CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

St Thomas College, Ranni being a state-aided institution, affiliated to Mahatma Gandhi University, follows the curriculum prepared and designed by the university. Every Academic year begins with the preparation of an Academic Calendar where dates are allocated for various academic activities. The faculty members of our college participate in curriculum designing committees and contribute towards curriculum planning and designing. Each academic session

begins at the college with department level meetings where syllabus is discussed and teachers are entrusted with various portions. Time table is prepared scientifically for various departments by the heads of the departments after consultation with other teachers of the department. Teachers prepare lectures according to the syllabus and portion given to them and at the beginning of each semester students are given the syllabus and references as per the syllabus. Special effort will be taken to ensure that students are aware of POs, PSOs and COs. Enough time is given to students to access the main library which has sufficient books catering to the syllabus. Students are provided internet access in the library whereby they get free access to e-journals and e-books. Since our college library provides access to E-resources through N-list, students could access learning materials during the Covid affected period, when students could not come directly to college. With the outbreak of Covid- 19, when students could not come to college, teachers took online classes using platforms like Google meet, Zoom etc, audio clippings relevant to curriculum also were posted in WhatsApp, Telegram etc. When normal classes were there before the spread of Covid-19, for successful delivery of curriculum following teaching methods were used i. The conventional Chalk and Blackboard method was followed. ii. ICT enabled teaching and learning method was followed. iii. Group discussion was encouraged among students. iv. Notes pertaining to the syllabus were distributed to the students at college. v. Field works, surveys, educational tours etc were organized by departments in accordance with the curriculum. vii. Seminars and workshops by experts in various fields were organized in order to help students. viii. Sufficient instrumentation facility was given to the students for their practical classes. Our institution has a very transparent and efficient student evaluation system which is regularly monitored by the head of the institution. Apart from class tests conducted at department level, an internal exam and model exam is conducted at the college level. Viva-voce is also conducted and students are given assignments on various topics. During the Covid period tests were conducted on online mode. Records of internal exams, assignments, projects etc are maintained in each department. College makes regular assessment of result of each department after university declares results of each semester. Teaching and learning process of the whole college is monitored regularly and wherever improvements are required it is addressed promptly. Special attention is given to weak students and their development is ensured. Through all these methods effective curriculum delivery is ensured.

Feedback Obtained

For any institution to improve and prosper collecting feedback from the stakeholders of the institution is imperative, only then can we assess the performance of the institution. Feedback is taken from students, teachers, parents and alumni of the institution regarding the appropriateness and aptness of the curriculum, the proficiency of the teachers and overall performance of the institution. After each academic year feedback from students are collected on a scale ranging from 0-4, (Strongly agree, Agree, Neutral, Disagree and Strongly Disagree) whereby the performance of the institution, appropriateness of the curriculum, competency of teachers etc are assessed. Feedback from students also pertains to location of the college, canteen facilities, laboratory facilities, library accessibility and facilities, office, administration of the college etc. Feedback is collected from UG and PG students. Feedback is collected by sending google forms to all stakeholders (students, parents, teachers and Alumni). Whenever there is a Parent Teacher meeting or Alumni meeting, feedback is collected directly from parents and Alumni by providing feedback forms. While one or two PTA General Body meetings are convened every year, Department level PTA meeting are held too often in order to maintain a close and concerted relation between parents and teachers and also to regularly update parents regarding the performance of their wards. The strength and weakness of the system is summarized and analyzed based on the feedbacks received. Feedback on curriculum received from the teachers are analysed and suggestions for improvements are forwarded to the university authorities for timely intervention and remedial action. Since teachers from our college are designated to Higher academic bodies like Board of studies and Senate of Mahatma Gandhi University, our institution is in a position to contribute towards quality improvement in Curriculum Revision and research. Opinion of non-teaching staff is also taken into account. The feedback given by parents, especially their suggestions and comments are given due importance, in accordance with their suggestions future developments of the institution are planned. Feedbacks received are discussed in departments and where ever required, modifications and corrections are made feedbacks are also discussed in concerned committees. As per the directions of the Principal all academic matters are discussed in the staff council of the college, which comprises of representatives from all departments of the college and the IQAC coordinator is also a member. Feedbacks received from all stakeholders are discussed in IQAC Executive meeting and IQAC General Body meetings. Principal also calls staff meetings of teachers to ascertain the opinion of all teachers regarding feedback received from all stakeholders. The proposals of committees and departments are forwarded to the management. The manager, along with the governing board members discuss future plan of action on the basis of the suggestions and proposals provided by all the committees and departments of the college. The manager after taking all governing board members into confidence initiate infrastructure development programs and construction works to provide a student friendly campus. The feedbacks received from students, parents, teachers and Alumni are very important for the overall development of the college.

To effectively address the needs and problems of students Tutor ward system has been practiced by the college for several years: whereby each ward is taken care of by tutors so as to meet their academic and psychological needs and also to improve their performance at academic level. Tutors regularly meet wards they are entrusted with, one to one meetings are held, through which their problems and requirements are identified and addressed. Where ever help from institution or management is required the concerned authority is intimated about the same. Apart from this program, slow learners are brought forward through Student Support Program whereby regular mentoring sessions both internal and external are conducted, this provides children adequate platform to come forward. For advanced learners on the other hand Walk with the Scholar program helps them to develop their inherent talents and potential to the maximum. Advanced learners are provided internal and external mentoring classes by resource persons who have excelled in this field. For identifying advanced and slow learners at the beginning of the academic year they are assessed through tests and other methods, after that teachers are given charge of WWS and SSP and students are distributed among them according to their calibre. Teachers meet the students in regular intervals and provide necessary assistance so as to enable them to develop their inherent talents to the maximum of their capacity In addition to SSP, Remedial coaching classes are provided to slow learners to address their backwardness they are given special coaching and individual attention through this method. They are provided remedial coaching before the regular class hours or after the class hours or during lunch breaks, free hours are also used. The attendance record and reports of Walk with the Scholar program, Student Support Program, Tutorial system and remedial coaching is maintained by coordinators of the program and teachers-in-charge of the program. Feedback from students with respect to external mentoring classes is also taken.

Student Evaluation is very important for the effective functioning of any educational institution, hence our institution has a very transparent and efficient student evaluation system which is regularly monitored by the head of the institution, apart from class tests conducted at department level, an internal exam and model exam is conducted at the college level. The institution has an Internal Exam Committee which conducts exams, they prepare time table for the exams and accordingly teachers prepare question papers and submit to the committee. After the exams students are shown their answer scripts. Viva voce is also conducted and students are given assignments on various topics. Reforms like open book exams, online exams etc have also been implemented by various departments. After the outbreak of Covid- 19 department level tests to a large extent have been conducted on online mode. Records of internal exams, assignments, projects etc are maintained in each department. College makes regular assessment of results of each department, activities of departments, requirements of students etc. Internal marks are assessed on the basis of tests conducted, assignments and seminars presented by the students and based on their attendance, student's performance in the class is also taken into consideration. All students are shown their internal marks before their marks are uploaded.

Before the beginning of each academic year all the departments prepare an action plan to be included in the academic calendar, which is sent to the IQAC

coordinator, the coordinator compiles the data and also prepares exam dates in tune with the University exam calendar. Internal examinations are conducted by the college in a centralized mode. The model exam adheres to the University pattern and is held before the University exams. Once all data is ready pertaining to each year the academic calendar is sent for printing and in the beginning of the academic year it is distributed to all departments.

Infrastructure Maintenance and utilization of Funds Maintenance of infrastructure and utilization of funds of the college is very important for the steady and consistent development of the institution, keeping this objective in view the college has a maintenance and utilization committee comprising of representatives from management, teaching and non-teaching staff and students, functioning in the college. Utilisation of funds from PD account for matters concerning maintenance and utilization is taken care of by the committee. It also keeps an account of how college provides physical, academic and support facilities like laboratories, library, sports goods and computers. The institution has a well-established system for the maintenance and utilisation of classrooms, computers, laboratories etc in the campus. College has College Development Committee, Library Advisory Committee, Hostel Committee, Stock Verification Committee, RUSA committee etc to monitor and spearhead the activities of the college and evaluate its performance. Maintenance of Physical facilities like smart classrooms, auditoriums, laboratories etc are also effectively done. Every year a fixed amount (with yearly increment) is allocated for purchasing books and equipments like book stands in the library. Fund is also allocated for the yearly renewal of journal (both print and online) and e-resource subscriptions. Some of the departments have individual libraries with appropriate stock and issue register. Expenditure for the purchase of items like chemicals, glass wares and also for the purchase and repairing of electronic, electrical and nonelectrical equipments and goods of the laboratories of physics, chemistry, botany and zoology departments is also met from the PD account. Expenses against the purchase of sports goods, TA, DA for students and ground maintenance are managed from the fund in the PD account. Repairing of computers and infrastructure is funded by the management there is a System Administrator who keeps track of the functioning of computers. The college has internet connection of 100 Mbps. Above all, PTA fund is used for several purposes. Fund allocation is discussed and approved by the PTA executive committee members and is utilized for purposes like paying the electricity and water bills of the college. Expenses like the salary of the non-government staff or the temporary staff of the college and the purchase of materials and other requirements for the extracurricular activities of the students is also met from the PTA fund.

1. Academic and administrative decentralization . The academic and administrative functions of the college is controlled and coordinated by the Manager and Principal jointly. In the academic realm, with the Principal as the chair, the staff council, consisting of the heads of all departments as its members, acts an advisory committee of the college. Various departments and the rest of the faculty members and students come under this. All the administrative functions of the college are also monitored and controlled by the manager and the principal. With the principal as the official administrative head, the officials of the administrative section like the superintendent, head accountant, LD and UD clerks, office attendants, Grade 1 librarian, library assistant, and lab assistants work under the head of the institution. Various sections like the exam section, fees section, bills section, scholarships section, admission section and e-grants sections handled by the administrative staff come in this category. 2. Criteria wise committees of IQAC has been constituted comprising of members representing teaching and non-teaching staff, students and other stakeholders of the college for coordinating important academic and non-academic activities of the college. Each committee has a convener, a few coordinators and members. Smooth functioning of the various activities of the college is ensured by the formation of committees, subcommittees and various clubs and forums headed by the Principal and are comprised of representatives from all the stakeholders of the college. One such committee is the Internal Quality Assurance Cell that is functioning very efficiently in the college. It comprises of members, as stipulated by the UGC, representatives of the teaching and the nonteaching staff, and also representatives of other stakeholders of the college like PTA

Vice President and alumni representatives. Academicians and local body representatives also are part of this. The NAAC Reaccreditation committee ensures that quality is maintained in all the academic and non-academic activities of the college. UGC planning board and steering committee is in charge of scheduling and managing the UGC funds and all revenues generated from various sources. The multifarious developmental activities of the college are effectively carried out by the college development committee. The research development committee leads the research activities of the college. Funds for research programmes like seminars, workshops and symposiums are procured by the committee from various governmental and nongovernmental organizations. Admission committee ensures that all rules and regulations stipulated by the government in admission procedure are strictly adhered to. Anti-ragging committee looks into matters related to all kinds of improper activities of the students that come under the purview of ragging. Students' grievance and redressal committee is a platform where the grievances of the students are addressed in a fair and democratic manner. Career guidance and placement committee not only organizes programmes to make the students aware of their career prospects, but also offers opportunities for job placement. Women's Cell provides girl students platform for harnessing the hidden talents among them and provides classes on women empowerment and Gender sensitization programmes are organised in association with IQAC.

There are a number of clubs in the college which organises programmes to promote the development of the students. Faculty members are encouraged to participate in FDP courses, orientation courses and Refresher courses. Staff meetings and Staff council meetings are regularly convened in order to take important academic decisions, thus providing faculty members an opportunity to become a part of decision making process.

Curriculum Development

Since our college is affiliated to MG university, we follow the Curriculum development initiatives taken by the University through its Academic Council and various Board of Studies and our teachers participate in these bodies and workshops conducted for the purpose. IQAC keeps a track of academic development and quality improvement of the institution. Examination committee ensures smooth conduct of examination

Teaching and Learning

Quality improvement strategies are adopted for students as well as teachers. Both teachers and students are given orientation classes. Each academic year begins with the preparation of a general timetable and in accordance with the same heads of various departments prepares their respective department timetables. Department heads assign topics to all teachers of the department and they in turn prepare a teaching plan for the topics assigned to them. Attendance system of students is automated and is regularly monitored. Apart from the regular classes, weak students are given special attention, by providing them remedial classes.

Examination and Evaluation

Examination and Evaluation system present in the college is as per evaluation norms put forward by the University. Besides regular test papers, one internal exam and a model exam are conducted in each semester. Assignments, projects and seminars are given to the students and their performance is evaluated. Internal marks are put on the notice board of concerned departments for verification by the students. Grievances regarding the internal marks if any, will be addressed by the Grievance Redress Cells at the department level/college level/ and University level. A senior teacher serves as the Controller of Examinations at the College level.

Research and Development

Research plays a very important role in the development of any educational

institution, hence our institution encourages research oriented activities of both teachers and students. Research Committee of the college organises classes for teachers and students. Faculties are granted leave for attending FDP courses, they are also encouraged to participate in seminars, conferences and workshops throughout the country and duty leave is granted for the same. The Research Development Committee monitors and co ordinates the research activities of the teachers and students. Research Forums are organised in all PG departments. A faculty member got research guide ship during this period.

Industry Interaction / Collaboration

Students from various departments have actively participated in various field projects and internships with various industries and institutions. Collaborative activities are extensively encouraged by the institution, we have collaborated with IIT Mumbai, TBGRI, Palode, MRDO, Chengannur etc for taxonomy Identification, Mushroom cultivation etc. One of the outstanding collaboration the institution has is with Unnat Bharat Abhiyan (UBA), Covid-19 awareness programmes, training on sanitizer making for students, distribution of sanitizers and masks, all these activities were organised by the institution in collaboration with UBA.

All the activities of the institution are centered on the universal and basic protocols of environment protection and sustainable/eco friendly energy initiatives. Awareness classes are conducted on a regular basis to disseminate the methods of protection of the environment. Services of organisations like "Harithakerala Mission", "Kerala State Council for Science, Technology and Environment", "District Suchithwa Mission" and "Green Ambassador" are utilised for promoting the values of environment consciousness among the students. "Environment Protection and Waste Management Workshop" and "Electronic Waste Disposal Awareness Workshop" are two such initiatives undertaken by the institution in this regard. One day seminar on the "Environmental History of Pamba" hosted by the institution in collaboration with PambaParirakshanaSamiti has been an initiative to identify the environmental threats in this region,

motivating the students to be responsible citizens who follow eco friendly practices. Technical sessions on the topics "Air Pollution and Climate Change" and "Emerging Environmental Issues of 21st Century in the Context of Sustainable Development" have shed light on the importance of inventing and exploring sustainable energy resources for a better living in the future. Field visits to places of ecological importance is encouraged by the institution to get a first hand experience of understanding the importance of conserving the biodiversity for a stable and healthy ecosystem. Apart from these, World Environment Day, World Ozone Day and other occasions of environmental importance are observed by the staff and students of the institution through activities like campus cleaning, planting trees, waste removal etc:- Active participation of the volunteers of NSS, NCC and BhoomitraSena (an initiative of the Directorate of Environment Climate Change) have enabled the smooth conduct of the environment-friendly initiatives in the campus. Right from the year of its inception, more than five decades ago, the institution has taken all measures and efforts to maintain eco friendliness in its campus. Innovation and Entrepreneurship Development Centre (IEDC) and Entrepreneurship Development (ED) club have played a key role in igniting the young minds to explore new ideas in the fields of start-ups, culinary arts, sign language, design thinking, media, problem solving and blogging. Every year Entrepreneurship Excellency award is given to the best Entrepreneur of Pathanamthitta district. Various departments have organised skill enhancement programmes like mushroom cultivation, organic farming, soap preparation methods, self-defense training ("Fierce Diva") etc- "Hello English"- provides hands on training in language skills like listening, speaking and reading using the software Tell Me More. College Union Arts Festival "Mizhivu 2020" and other festivities hosted by the college union on the occasion of Onam and Christmas celebrations have provided a platform for the students to foster their talents. "Computer Hardware and Peripherals" - a skill-based course offered by ASAP, has been beneficial to many students. Career Guidance Cell, apart from conducting "WHAT NEXT"-a five-hour, career-skill-acquisition certificate programme for the graduating batch-has also initiated collaborative programmes with reputed organisations to conduct training sessions and tests to enhance the employability of the students. Training has been given to NSS volunteers in LED Bulb making, stitching, paper-bag making, safe bio waste disposal methods and leadership skills. Various departments and clubs have organized Interdepartmental and intradepartmental competitions to foster their talents. Special training is offered to skilled students in the field of sports by the Physical Education Department. Empowerment Programme WWS (Walk with the Scholar) and SSP (Scholar Support Programme) cater to the students' needs for empowerment in the curricular and co-curricular areas. Through remedial coaching and bridge courses students are empowered to cope with the challenges encountered in the curriculum. College has a commendable teaching-learning-evaluation system in place apart from tutorials and mentoring sessions through which students are empowered to perform well in their academics. Apart from the skill training sessions offered to the students, Men's Forum and Women's Cell ("Tharjani"), have also addressed matters related to women empowerment. Legal Literacy Cell and gender sensitisation programmes ("NAAM") have been instrumental in imparting a sense of fellow-feeling and knowledge regarding legal protection, human rights, gender equality and gender inclusiveness, thus empowering the beneficiaries psychologically. To empower and encourage students they are offered all support to avail scholarships from the governmental, non-governmental, and other agencies. "Igniting Minds" and "Merit Day" are conducted to felicitate meritorious students. Evidence of Success: 7 students got "A" grade in various competitions in the M.G. University intercollegiate Youth Festival. Interdepartmental and intradepartmental competitions hosted by various departments, clubs and forums have boosted the confidence of the winners and got selection to participate in various intercollegiate competitions. Around 30 students won prizes in such competitions and such exposures have had a great influence on the overall personality development of the students. The initiatives of the college to nurture the creative, literary and artistic talents of the student community have found fruition in the College magazine "Gulmohar", and "XPRESSIONS", magazine published by students of ASAP course. Several NCC cadets got selection to participate in the Army Attachment Camp held at Pangode (7 cadets), National Integration Camp held at Rajasthan (3 cadets) and Mountaineering Training Camp at Himachal Pradesh (1 Cadet). One cadet represented Kerala NCC contingent and participated in the Rajpath Parade held at New Delhi on 26th January 2020. 34 cadets passed the 'B' certificate and 24 cadets passed the 'C' certificate examination. Two BTM students secured 9th and 11th ranks and one MTTM secured second rank in the Mahatma Gandhi

University Exam, March 2019. Two students each from II PG Physics and Chemistry are selected for Aspire scholarship by DCE for doing M.sc Project. And one second M.sc physics student got selection to do project work under Student Project Scheme of KSCSTE with a scholarship of Rs. 10000/- Majority of the pass-out students got admission for Higher studies The Average pass percentage of General English increased One athlete participated in the District Sports Meet and bagged Gold in 400Mts and Silver in 800 Mts. College Volleyball team participated in the MG University Intercollegiate tournament and was qualified for the semifinal of Zonal Tournament.
